Fukui, Japan

If the past few months are any indication, tourism in Japan could surpass pre-pandemic levels in 2024. To escape the urban sprawl and see one of the most spiritual parts of the country, go to Fukui. Naomi Mano, president and chief executive of the Tokyo-based travel company Luxurique, says the city is a destination for temples, onsens (hot spring baths), art and food (specifically Echizen crab). With a new bullet train line set to open in March, travelers can get to Fukui from Tokyo in about three hours.

Don't miss: Mano sends visitors to Eiheiji Temple, one of the most important sites for Zen Buddhists. "It's the temple where all of the Zen monks go to train to become higher monks," she said.

Two Ports in Fukui



Located in the northwestern part of Fukui Pref.



Tsuruga Port

Located in the center of Fukui Pref.

You can access to center of Kyoto-city about 2 hours drive from Tsuruga port without worries about traffic jams or less than 1 hour by train.

There are 2 ports, Fukui port and Tsuruga port

and the main port to accommodate big ships is

Tsuruga port.

Two Ports in Fukui

Tsuruga Port

With its width and depth,
Tsuruga Port is excellent for large vessels.

This port has three wharfs allowing cruise liners to make call.

The largest wharf, the Mariyama North Wharf B·C, can accommodate large cruise liners, even those in the 220,000-ton class. There is also a wharf called the Mariyama South Wharf A·B is under construction to be extended and Kanegasaki Wharf C·D is located near Tsuruga city.




Fukui Port

It has good accessibility to popular tourist Spots in Fukui, including Tojinbo Cliffs.

50,000-ton class liners can make call at this point.

This port has good accessibility to Tojinbo Cliffs, which is one of the most popular tourist spots in Fukui, as well as Eiheiji-temple, which is the head temple of th Soto sect. The wharf, with its 555-meter length and 10-meter depth, can accommodate 50,000-ton class cruise liners.







Shojin ryori (meals of traditional temple cuisine) is one of the traditional Japanese dishes. Since killing living creatures is prohibited in Buddhism, Shojin ryori is prepared without meat, fish, or other animal products. Ingredients used include vegetables, legumes, grains and seaweed. Shojin ryori is currently popular not only as a vegetarian dish, but also as a healthy cuisine.





Take in the spectacular 50foot-high cliffs of unusually
shapedpentagonal and
hexagonal rock columns.
Created by a volcanic
eruption 130 million years
ago and further shaped by
the repeated crashing of
waves, Tojinbo is one of only
three such rock formations in
the world.

Board a sightseeing boat for an approximately 30-minute cruise offering a different perspective of the Tojinbo Cliffs and Oshima Island which you cannot get from land.

Cruise around a deserted island and shore reefs eroded by raging waves, including a superb view of some magnificent sheer cliffs.





Echizen City and Sabae City, located in central Fukui Prefecture, have a concentration of traditional crafts such as lacquerware, Japanese paper, cutlery, bamboo crafts, and pottery, as well as local industries such as eyeglasses and textiles, within a 10 km radius. Craftsmen continue to make products that meet the needs of the times while carrying on traditional techniques. You surely have a chance to see craftsmen at work and to buy from their stores.

Tsuruga

During the 1940s, thousands of Jewish refugees from Poland and Lithuania were saved by visas issued by Sugihara Chiune (1900–1986). Sugihara was the vice-consul of Japan in Lithuania at the time, and he issued thousands of life-saving visas, secretly breaking the Japanese government's rules. These visas allowed the refugees to travel through Japan and onward to safety, and many entered the country through Tsuruga after long, dangerous travels. This museum focuses on the background of these events, as well as personal memories of refugees meeting the people of Tsuruga.

Kehi Jingu Shrine

Kehi Jingu Shrine has been famous for its "Chomeisui," or "water of long life," for roughly 1,300 years. When the shrine was rebuilt in the year 702, a water spring was discovered here.

Kehi no Matsubara

Kehi no Matsubara is a beach over a kilometer long, lined with some 17,000 Japanese pine trees. There are walking trails here.



Nihonkai Sakanamachi

Nihonkai Sakanamachi is the largest seafood market on the Sea of Japan coast of the country. This huge market features over 50 shops to explore. In addition to fresh seafood.



The Five Lakes of Mikata

- Mikata, Suigetsu, Sugako, Kugushiko, and Hiruga -are all clustered together into a small area of southern Fukui, but all distinct from one another. Each one has a different depth and a different level of salt in its water, making each lake a different color. It is also registered as a Ramsar wetland in November 2005. The nearby Rainbow Line is an 11-kilometer toll road through the mountains, with Enjoy panoramic scenery far above the Five Lakes of Mikata.





Ichijodani Asakura Clan Historic Ruins

The Ichijodani Asakura Clan Historic Ruins were once a castle town during the Warring States period (1467–1568). Starting in 1967, excavations rediscovered the layout of the town, including the home of the feudal lord, samurai residences, temples, and houses of merchants and artisans. Some samurai residences and merchants' quarters have been rebuilt along a 200-meter-long stretch of road.





Fukui Prefecture is home to 37 traditional Sake breweries, both large and small. Since long ago, the prefecture has been one of the largest rice producers in Japan, producing a lot of rice that is ideal for sake brewing. The sea and mountains are also truly beautiful products, and the sake brewing is made possible by the delicious water that comes from them. You have a chance to enjoy many kinds of sake at most restaurants in Fukui Prefecture.

Many historic artisan skills still exist as industries in the prefecture, attracting visitors.


We will develop such traditional Fukui crafts for the luxury class passengers of the cruise ship.
