In the morning, we visited St. George's Parish School in Ontario. Our students, divided into two groups, showed some traditional Japanese toys such as *kendama* and *origami*, and told the students there how to play with them. It was very lucky that each group interacted with various kinds of students, from five-year-old kids to Middle School ones. Both our students and the American students seemed to enjoy the friendly exchange.
